NOTEWORTHY NEWS**Governor Signs Law to Honor Bucks County's George Niblock**

Legislation that honors a Buck County advocate for his tireless work on behalf of the new U.S. Route 202 Parkway has been signed into law by Gov. Tom Corbett, said Rep. Kathy Watson (R-Bucks/144th), who sponsored the measure.

"George Niblock helped lead efforts to make this parkway a realization and formed the 'Support the Bypass for Route 202' coalition on which he and his colleagues spent a great deal of time and energy," Watson said. "Now, as construction continues to finish the parkway, I am pleased that George's long-standing commitment to our transportation infrastructure will be acknowledged and forever remembered with this designation."

During his time advocating the parkway, Niblock coordinated town hall meetings,

prepared and collected petitions in support of the project, represented Bucks County in meetings with state officials and served as liaison between state and local officials and PennDOT during the design phase.


Niblock, who earned a mechanical engineering degree from Penn State and a business degree from LaSalle University, was president of Niblock and Associates, a small equipment supplier to the food service industry. He is now semi-retired, but remains active as a board member with the Bucks County Economic Development Corporation, where he serves as chairman of the transportation committee. He also is a member of the Central Bucks Chamber. He and his wife of more than 50 years, Jeanne, have resided in Bucks County for five decades. They have two daughters and five grandchildren.

House Bill 389, now Act 82 of 2011, was signed on Oct. 27.

The Niblock bridge naming follows a designation made a few months ago to name a portion of the parkway from Route 63 in Montgomery Township, Montgomery County, to Route 611 in Doylestown Township, Bucks County, as the George A. Penglase Memorial Parkway.

BCIDC past President, William Barndt, was Instrumental in Saving the New Hope Ivyland Railroad



William H. Barndt, a prominent business and civic leader and a longtime resident of West Rockhill Township, passed away on Monday, October 10, 2011. He was 91.

He was born in Perkasie and graduate of Sell-Perk High School in 1936. Immediately after graduation, Bill began his banking career at The First National Bank of Philadelphia.

He enlisted in the army in 1942 and upon his return he enlisted in the U.S. Army Reserve. In 1948, Bill became an executive officer of the newly formed 32nd Quartermaster Group Pennsylvania Army National Guard headquarters in Sellersville. He also served during the Korean War, being deployed to Korea for one year. Following the war, Bill commanded the 2059th U.S. Army Reserve School, Bethlehem, from 1966 until 1972. After 31 years of service, Colonel Barndt retired from the military in 1973.

Upon his return to civilian life, Bill continued his banking career. After the merger of First National Bank with the Pennsylvania Company in 1955, he was assigned to the main office operations as Assistant Treasurer. After 45 years of service, Bill retired in 1981 as Executive Vice-President of First Pennsylvania Bank.

Bill studied at the Wharton Evening School of Accounts and Finance at the University of Pennsylvania, completed courses from the American Institute of Banking, and was a graduate of the Stonier Graduate School of Banking at Rutgers University.

Bill was active in civic and community affairs, both locally and in Philadelphia. He was known best for his service to The Penn-

sylvania Society, where he served as Executive Director for 18 years, until retiring in 2000.

He was active with regional United Way Campaigns, Freedom Valley Council of the Girl Scouts of America and served numerous other boards and committees, including the Pennsylvania Chamber of Commerce, Pennsylvania Committee for Employer Support of the Guard and Reserve, and the Bucks County Industrial Development Corporation.

During his time at Bucks County Industrial Development Corporation (BCIDC), Bill was instrumental in saving the New Hope Ivyland Railroad. Jerry Forest, Past President and current Secretary said that Bill was interested in preserving the railroad, partly as a bit of history, but mostly to preserve the 17+ mile right of way through the center of Bucks County for future generations. He saw future potential, and once lost, it could never be recovered. He believed that the BCIDC had a duty to do what ever was within its power to make sure that the railroad and right of ways be preserved for Bucks County. In 1974 with Bill's diligence, dedication and the board's support BCIDC acquired the land from PECO.

Carl Wallnau, BCEDC Past President and current Member at Large, said that Bill was a strong dedicated advocate who went over and above normal involvement. Bill personally searched for a partner who had the same interest and could be worthy of financing. After several rejections Bill found a company willing to take on the challenge of this project, McHugh Brothers Heavy Hauling, Inc.

In 1954, he helped to organize the Pennridge Junior Chamber of Commerce in Perkasie.

In addition to his wife, he is survived by three children, six grandchildren, two great-grandchildren and one sister.

Natural Products Discovery Institute to be Housed in the Bio Tech Center in Doylestown.

The Institute for Hepatitis and Virus Research (IHRV) announced its Natural Products Discovery Institute (NPDI), which will serve as a long-term resource for the discovery and development of biological products from natural products, at its annual symposium on Oct. 28.

The resources which will be housed within the Pennsylvania Biotechnology Center located in Doylestown, was created to maintain, grow and perform research on the collection of natural products donated from Merck & Co. Natural products refer to compounds derived from living organisms, such as plants and microorganisms.

The Institute for Hepatitis and Virus Research will also make its collections accessible to qualified researchers and help promote therapeutic drug discovery and natural products.

The IHRV is the research division of the Hepatitis B Foundation which was established in 2003 as an independent nonprofit research institute.

ICE Steps Up Employer Enforcement

The U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services has announced stepped up enforcement directed at employers. It has notified 1,000 employers to get ready for I-9 audits. The I-9 Form must be completed within three (3) business days of the employee's start date and retained – for three years or until one year after the employee terminates, whichever is later – for every employee hired after November 6, 1986.

The I-9 form is intended to verify two separate things: (1) that the person is who s/he says s/he is (identity); and (2) that the person is authorized to work in the United States. The documents which are acceptable for these purposes are listed on the back of the I-9. Documents in List A may be used to establish both identity and right to work. Otherwise, documents from List B establish identity and those

from List C establish right to work. Note that the employee must produce ORIGINAL documents. The employer cannot accept copies. However, the employer should (is not required to) make copies of the documents presented and retain them with the I-9. (This will enable you to prove down the road that you actually did get documents.)

The new enforcement emphasis is demonstrated by a fine of \$1,1047,110 assessed against clothing retailer Abercrombie & Fitch for "technology-related deficiencies" in the company's Michigan retail stores' electronic I-9 verification system.

Employment Tax Amnesty for Workers Misclassified as Independent Contractors

Many businesses, lured by the reduced financial and legal burdens of engaging workers as independent contractors, may have misclassified workers as independent contractors rather than employees. This leaves businesses with a hidden tax liability, plus interest and penalties, if the misclassification is discovered by the IRS.

The IRS recently announced a new program that allows employers to reclassify workers as employees rather than independent contractors and greatly reduce their liability for past employment taxes to approximately 10% of what would otherwise be due. Generally speaking, a worker is only an independent contractor if the employer has control over only the work product, and not how the work is done. An evaluation of the behavioral, financial and other terms of the relationship of the parties need to be performed to determine whether an independent contractor or employment relationship actually exists. For example, if the employer controls how the work is done, by providing training and extensive instructions, the worker is likely an employee. If the worker pays his or her own expenses without reimbursement and a true profit or loss is incurred

from the business relationship, rather than a wage, he or she may be more akin to an independent contractor.

The tax amnesty provided for in this program applies to federal employment taxes only. Therefore, businesses should consider other potential liabilities that may also exist. Nevertheless, the potential for significant federal tax savings may still make participation in the program preferable. All factors should be fully considered before a decision is made to participate in this program. What is PREP? Partnership for Regional Performance Program

The Department of Community and Economic Development (DCED) has created the guidelines for the Partnership for Regional Economic Performance (PREP) program, which encourages cooperation for the administration of economic development initiatives. PREP is designed to "help deliver superior customer service to the business community," DCED formally released the guidelines that make available \$11.88 million to regional economic development service providers across the commonwealth.

The regional economic development service providers in southeastern Pennsylvania are the IDC's (County economic development agencies), SBDC's (Small Business Development Centers) and DVIRC (Delaware Valley Industrial Resource Center) or core service providers.

The core service providers listed above are organizations which provide targeted economic development services throughout Pennsylvania. Under the PREP program, these organizations will partner in self defined geographic regions to set forth a comprehensive plan to: (1) inform existing businesses and potential entrepreneurs of the services offered by each regional organization and (2) provide documented referrals and integrated service delivery between and among the partner organizations

Regional partnerships will represent a consortium of service providers listed above, and should include any additional partners deemed pertinent to an integrated and comprehensive regional economic development network. DCED will approve only one consolidated application per region.

Each partnership will represent a region of multiple counties. The geographic service boundaries are not predetermined by the Commonwealth of PA and should reflect a process undertaken by the partnering organizations to define a regional footprint that ensures efficient and effective coordination of services. A core service provider may be included in more than one work plan if its service delivery area covers more than one PREP region. The southeast region would include the five southeastern counties and also Berks County as the southeast region. The region will be called the Penn Southeast Region.

DCED will establish a panel to review all proposals. It is anticipated that DCED will provide feedback and input during this process in order to strengthen proposals and, as necessary, discuss funding levels. At this time there has been no decision as top funding levels or feedback on the region.

Eastern Warehouse Distributors/AutoParts Warehouse approved to borrow \$2,000,000 from the Pennsylvania Industrial Development Authority (PIDA) Inc. AutoParts Warehouse is a wholesale automotive parts distributor, headquartered in Langhorne, PA. The loan will be used to acquire and renovate the 110,000 square foot one-story building located 1050 Wheeler Way, **Langhorne, Middletown Township**. The company currently has 138 full-time employees and will create 90 additional jobs.

Vertical Screen World Headquarters Building Awarded High-Score for LEED Platinum Certification

The Vertical Screen an applicant screening firm has been award LEED Platinum Certification for its new, state-of-the-art world headquarters building. Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Platinum is the highest sustainability designation granted by the US Green Building Council (USGBC).

The shuttle has been a tremendous success and is averaging close to 50 rides per day!
